Dimensions of participation - Participation and inclusion in integrated theatre in Norway

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The purpose of this Ph.D. project is to examine aspects of participation in integrated theatre. What does inclusion and participation involve in integrated theatre? What social and artistic aspirations and effects can be attached to this model? How can one facilitate optimal participation in integrated theatre, and what does an integrated model lead to in terms of significance and meaning for those involved? The project includes fieldwork and practice-led action research, and will involve leading and studying a theatre group where people with intellectual disabilities and social education students work together in a devised theatre process. A desired outcome of this project is to be able to encourage the development of a model for practical pedagogical work aiming to facilitate participation in integrated theatre, and provide new dimensions to the aesthetic teaching model of social education studies at UiT (The Arctic University of Norway).
