Changes in the Finnish Deaf Perfomance Arts Since the 1950s

Finnish Deaf Culture Days have been reflecting changes in the identity of sign language community in the period 1956–2006. Presentation is based in my Master of Education research. The principal material was collected from the mass media of sign language community. The research used Paddy Ladd's theory of post-colonialism in Deaf culture and Stuart Hall's concepts of cultural identity. Through the research was seen that Finnish Deaf Culture Days were going through process of post-colonialism that can be separate into four different periods, as follows: 1) The reign of Finnish Language (1956–1969), 2) Period of Visualism (1970–1978), 3) Period of "Actual" sign language (1979–1996) and 4) Period of Sign languagehood (1997–). These periods can also be seen reflecting the post-colonialism process of sign language community as a whole.

Maija Koivisto is Finnish Deaf native signer. She has Master's degree in Education from University of Jyväskylä. There she took Finnish Sign Language and Drama Education as subject studies.
